## **JOURNAL DOS AND DO NOTS**

**DO NOT** include in-text variables in a format other than plain text unless absolutely necessary (such as a variable within a radical/square root, or those having subscripts of subscripts).

DO type out such variables using native characters and formatting to the Word environment; Greek and other accented or math characters can be rendered with the Symbol font or going to Insert > Symbol to include in Times New Roman.

Note: Excessive overuse of in-text variables (30 or more) in equation/image formatting (such as MS Word's built-in equation building or MathType) will result in the paper being sent back to the author to correct before it can move forward in the production process.

**DO NOT** submit incomplete references, or those formatted in a style dramatically different than the ones ACI uses. (For examples, please consult the <u>Sample Manuscript</u> or any previously published ACI journal papers.)

**DO NOT** use uncommon acronyms or abbreviations in references, particularly in regard to journal titles or conference proceedings.

DO include as much information as possible in all references (all authors; full titles of books, articles, journals, conference proceedings, and so on; journal volume and issue numbers; complete date information; for books, publishing company and location; for academic writings, what kind it is [for example, master's thesis, PhD dissertation, and so on], and name and location of institution; and page range or count).

**DO** refer to examples of ACI reference formatting for documents/standards produced by ACI and other standards-writing organizations (including ASTM International, CEN, CSA Group, and so on).

Note that a majority number of incomplete references will cause the paper to be sent back to the author to complete.

**DO NOT** submit papers with numbered references that are out of order based on chronological appearance in the text (particularly with regard to appearance in tables and figures).

DO make sure numbered references are listed correctly, with any references that make their first appearance in a table or figure being numbered in the order that the object callout appears in the text.

**DO NOT** include any numbered references in the synopsis of the paper. (Note: References can be mentioned, but numbering cannot start until the body of the paper.)

**DO NOT** format a name-date/alphabetical reference section as a numbered list.

DO make sure that name-date/alphabetical reference sections are indeed listed alphabetically.

DO NOT submit equations or tables in an uneditable format (particularly as flattened images/pictures).

**DO** use the built-in table formatting in Word to build tables, and equation-building software (MS Word's built-in equation building or MathType) to create equations.

Note: Tables and large equations that are submitted as flattened images/pictures will cause the paper to be returned to the author to be redone in an editable format.

DO NOT submit incomplete author biographies; but also, do not submit excessive information.

**DO** include current positions, education background (including locations of attended institutions), any ACI involvement (please note we can only include ACI activities due to space constraints—non-ACI affiliations will be removed), and research interests.

Note: Requesting further information from the author will delay publication.

**DO NOT** set up any notation lists in chronological order, and do not include variables in equation text boxes or acronyms.

**DO** set up notation lists in alphabetical order (A to Z, with upper-case letters coming before lower-case [for example: A, a, b, C, c, ...], followed by Greek letters).

Note: Notation lists are subject to the same rules regarding in-text variables being expressed as text as much as possible.
