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Cracking Expectations Expecting Concrete to Crack

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Cracks in Concrete

- Separation of concrete
- Tensile stress in concrete exceeds tensile strength of the concrete
- Concrete has excellent compressive strength properties
- Tensile strength is about 10% of compressive strength
- External tensile forces—Loads inducing tensile forces
- Internal tensile forces—Shrinkage

- Full Depth
- Partial
- Directional
 - Diagonal
 - Longitudinal
 - Transverse
- Corner
- Hairline
- Wide

Map

- Isolated
- Multiple Isolated

- Plastic cracking
- Shrinkage Cracking
- Thermal cracking
- Faulted cracks
 - Vertical displacement
 - Structural
 - Slab failure
 - Curling
- Non faulted cracks
 - No vertical displacement
 - Shrinkage
 - May not be structural

How about architectural cracking

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Everyone Knows that Concrete Cracks

What do you do

- Cut joints to locate cracks
- Use reinforcement to control crack width
- Use prestress concrete to keep concrete in compression
- Do nothing and let it crack randomly
- Concrete is going to crack!



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Managing Cracking Expectations

Three Legged Stool

Designer

- Determines Owner's desires
- Prepares construction document that will meet Owner's desires and local codes
- Should the Engineer discuss cracks with the Owner

Contractor(s)

- Construct in accordance with construction documents
- Specifications require cracks to be repaired
- Concrete supplier
 - Supply what is in the purchase order

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Why We Are Having this Seminar—The Stool Falls

- Everybody expects some cracking but
- Too many cracks
- Cracks are too wide
- Is the structure safe?
- Who is going to fix the cracks?
- Who caused the cracks?
- It is not me





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Is the Concrete Industry Insane?

- Has anyone been involved in a cracking dispute?
- Has anyone been involved in more that one cracking dispute?
- Doing the same thing over and over and expecting different results – this is the definition of insanity.

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If you do not like cracks, you may not like repaired cracks

Crack before repair



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The Solution--TEAR IT OUT

Cracking Expectations

- Who knows the Owner's cracking expectations?
- Do we tell the Owner that concrete will crack?
- Do we give the Owner an option to have a design that will minimize cracking?
- Do we tell the Owner it may cost more?
- What if the Owner states "I do not want cracks and I am not willing to pay more"?
- This typically does not end well.



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What if the Owner is not Happy?

- No one on the project team will be happy
- The Owner will not accept the building
- The Owner will not share the gold
- The Owner brings up this nasty term called "liquidated damages"



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Bottom Line

No body likes to tell the Owner "You got what you paid for"



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Owner's Opinion

 The Owner thinks and demands that the finished concrete should be as they presumed it would be even if it is built according to their specifications.





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Sometime the Owner kicks the stool over

- This is not what I want
- I cannot accept this
- Fix it at no cost with no schedule impact

Three Legged Stool

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Costco Mentality

- Anything that is bought from Costco can be returned
- No questions asked
- You get a refund





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Problem Resolution

- Who pays
- How do I get someone else to pay

All problems roll downhill





Why Did it Crack—Owner

- I did not buy cracked concrete
- The cracks look bad
- Everybody knows that you can't have this many cracks and this wide
- Somebody screwed up and it is not me



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Resolution Process—Engineer

Big Question

- Was the structure designed to be crack free?
- Can I see your calculations?
- Did you specify joint spacing?
- Very seldom does the Engineer have the privilege of participating in the solution.

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Resolution Process—Contractor

- Don't look at me—I followed the drawings and specifications, maybe
- I knew it was going to crack
- All concrete cracks

You are not getting the gold

No more Projects for you

Golden Rule

He who has the gold makes the rules



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Resolution Process—Subcontractor

Golden Rule

- Don't look at me—I followed the drawings and specifications, maybe
- Hey I did what you told me to do
- I knew it was going to crack
- All concrete cracks
- It is bad concrete—blame the concrete supplier

I am not asking Owner to accept cracked concrete Tear it out He who has the gold makes the rules



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Resolution Process—Concrete Supplier

- I provided what was required
- The concrete meets strength
- The concrete exceeds strength
- We did not put the cracks in the concrete
- Nobody requested low shrinkage concrete
- Nobody is willing to pay for low shrinkage concrete
- Low shrinkage concrete still cracks
- The concrete was not cracked when it left the plant

Last person standing says "I met strength, what more do you want?" the rules **Contractor or** Sub Contractor **Concrete Supplier** ۲,

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Partial Solution to Cracking Grievances

• Educate the Owner

Provide a design that will meet the Owner's cracking expectation

- Build the structure in accordance with design
- Supply materials that meet the design
- Still expect some cracking but that is not a surprise to anyone in the concrete industry
